3	<b>What are the aims, objectives, and purpose of the proposal?</b>	<p><b>Aims:</b> To provide an updated Local Plan which is the legal planning framework for the district.</p> <p><b>Objectives:</b> To consult on the final proposed plan before it is submitted to the Secretary of State, who will appoint an independent planning inspector to carry out a public Examination.</p> <p><b>Purpose:</b> The current Local Plan for South Staffordshire comprises the adopted Core Strategy and adopted Site Allocations document (SAD). However, through the development of the SAD, the Council committed to an immediate review of the Local Plan which is set out in adopted Policy SAD1. The review is necessary because all local planning authorities must review their plans every five years to ensure they are up to date and consistent with national planning policy.</p> <p>The new Local Plan for South Staffordshire will set out the strategic approach to the provision of housing and employment land, housing numbers, and Gypsy and Traveller pitch provision. It will test the role South Staffordshire could play in meeting regional housing shortfalls under the Duty to Cooperate.</p> <p>The Local Plan will contain policies on a wide and diverse range of topics including climate change, Green Belt, affordable and specialist housing, design, sustainable development, health and wellbeing, landscape, historic and natural environment, employment and open space.</p>

6	<b>Who is it intended to affect or benefit (the target population):</b>	<p>The Local Plan will ultimately identify sites for housing, additional Gypsy and Traveller pitches, and employment land and therefore affects all residents, stakeholders and businesses that live within or operate in it, and adjoining councils and residents. This is a Regulation 19 consultation which sets out the Council's final plan before it is submitted to the Secretary of State for Examination.</p>

7	<b>List relevant examples of data (qualitative and quantitative) or any consultation information available that will enable the impact assessment to be undertaken</b>	<p>Extensive consultation will be carried out with residents, developers and agents, stakeholders, landowners, parish councils, adjoining LPAs and parish/town councils and statutory bodies such as Environment Agency, Heritage England, Homes England and Natural England. A full list of consultees can be found in the Council's Statement of Community Involvement (SCI).</p> <p>The Council has a Duty to Cooperate under the Localism Act to consult with specific bodies, including adjacent local planning authorities.</p> <p>Consultation will be carried out online on the Council's website and bespoke consultation portal; online Locality and parish question and answer sessions; in person meetings; social media and GovDelivery; and with targeted and general deposit consultation documents. The council will write to everyone on the local Plan database either by email or letter. Information about the consultation will be published in the council's Review Magazine and a notice posted in the local press.</p> <p>There is a comprehensive evidence base to underpin Local Plan which contains statistical and monitoring data; environmental, sustainability, historic environment</p>
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		and specialist studies and assessments; reports etc on a wide variety of topics such as housing, employment, Gypsy and Traveller Needs Assessment, Strategic Housing Market Assessment, Strategic Housing and Economic Land Availability Assessment and Green Belt review.

At Regulation 19 stage, the council has to provide a summary of comments made, and the council's response to those comments. This will be before the inspector during the public Examination.</p>
